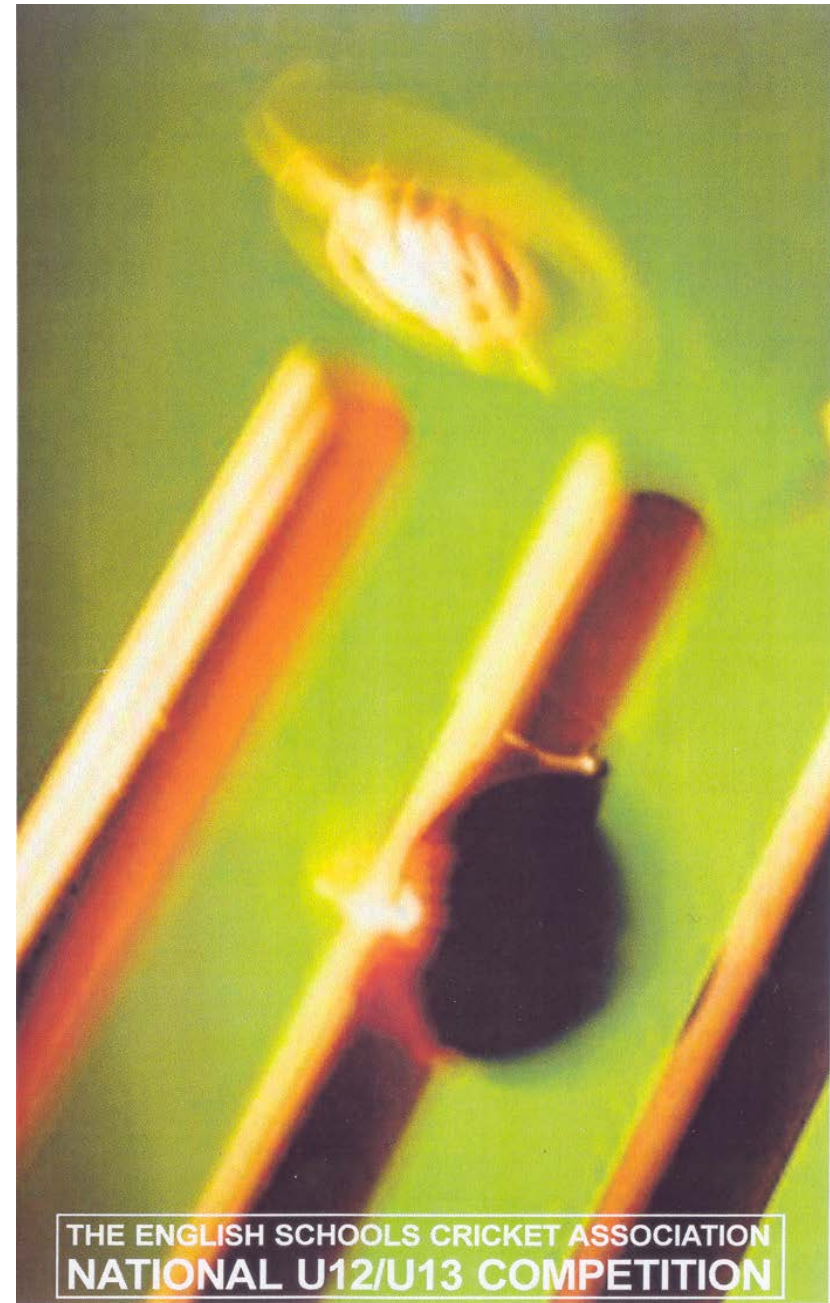

THE DAVID ENGLISH /BUNBURY CUP
PLAYING REGULATIONS

The Laws of Cricket will apply with the following exceptions:-

1. ESCA recommends that:
 - a) the length of the pitch shall be 21 yards
 - b) the stumps will be 27" x 8"
 - c) the ball will be 4.75 ounces.
 2. The length of the innings in the County Rounds shall be to a maximum of 30 overs (fewer by arrangement).
 3. The length of the innings in the National Rounds shall be to a maximum of 35 overs (fewer by arrangement, but not less than 30 unless rain affected). The Semi-Finals and Final will be 35 over matches.
 4. In County Rounds no bowler may bowl more than 6 overs (reduced proportionately for reduced over matches).
 5. In National Rounds no bowler may bowl more than 7 overs (reduced proportionately for reduced over matches).
 6. If a bowler breaks down the remaining bowls will be bowled by another bowler. Such part of an over will count as a full over when working out each bowler's limit.
 7. The side which scores the most runs shall be the winner.
 8. If the scores are level, the side which has lost the least wickets shall be the winner.
 9. If the scores continue level, the winner shall be the side, in order:-
 - (a) which has the higher score over the first 20 overs of the innings
 - (b) which loses the least number of wickets in the first 20 overs of the innings
 - (c) which has the higher score over the first 10 overs of the innings
 - (d) losing the least number of wickets in the first 10 overs of the innings.
 10. If the scores are still level a bowl out will be organised or at the last resort the captains will toss a coin to decide the winner.
 11.
 - a) If the start is delayed by rain, overs will not be deducted until one hour after the scheduled start. From that time they will be reduced at the rate of one over per further five minutes lost to a minimum of ten overs per side remaining.
 - b) If rain interrupts play, overs will be reduced at the rate of one over per five minutes lost from the time of the interruption, unless such an interruption occurs in the first hour. Should the interruption occur in the first hour then regulation 11.a) will apply.
 12. If rain curtails a match, the winner shall be the side scoring more runs in the first 10 overs of the innings.
 13. The decision of the Executive Committee is final in regard to any disputes or infringement of the rules.
- In the National Final, if both sides have agreed to ignore the regulations regarding a rain affected match, then should the game be rained off the trophy will be shared. There will not be a re-arranged final.

Note: The ESCA regulations concerning CLOSE FIELDERS will apply in all matches. The ECB regulations regarding the use of helmets for batsmen and wicketkeepers will be adhered to.

KINGS SCHOOL, GRANTHAM

The King's School is an English grammar school located in the market town of Grantham, in Lincolnshire, and is one of the oldest schools in the UK.

The King's School has an unbroken history on the same site since its re-endowment in 1528 by Richard Foxe, although its history can be traced back to 1329. Nicholas Pevsner in his Buildings of England, dates the original School building to 1497

Isaac Newton was a King's School scholar between 1655 and 1660. As was customary in his time, he carved his signature on the wall of what is today's school library, although the signature has never been confirmed as authentic; visitors from around the world come to view this indication of Newton's education.

Cricket forms a large part of the school's sporting life with 5 sides playing each week on the Midlands circuit. The school have produced many county winning sides over the years and usually represents Lincolnshire in the national cup competition, at both under 13 and under 15 level. This season is the first year that King's have managed to win the midlands section and progress through to the Bunbury cup Final.

We are very proud of what has been achieved by our under 13 team and wish them good luck for the final.

WHITGIFT SCHOOL

Whitgift is an independent day school with 1250 boys aged between 10 and 18. It was founded in 1596 by John Whitgift, Archbishop of Canterbury, during the reign of Elizabeth I.

The School enjoys a beautiful 45-acre parkland site with some of the finest facilities available nationally and a record of outstanding achievement in academic work, music, games and co-curricular activities. In addition to the already top-class sporting facilities, Whitgift has recently opened a new sports centre which is the largest on-site indoor sports building of any school in Britain.

Large numbers of boys are selected each year to represent Surrey, Sussex, Kent and Divisional sides. Many go on to win national titles or represent Great Britain in sports as diverse as cricket, rugby, hockey, fencing, table tennis, soccer, swimming, water polo, athletics and modern pentathlon.

Cricket has been played at the School for over 150 years and Whitgift has produced a number of England cricketers and first class County cricketers, the most recent being Surrey CCC players Jason Roy, Matthew Spriegel and Freddie van den Bergh (the latter lifting the Bunbury Cup in 2007 for Whitgift) who, while at the School, played in this National competition. During the last twelve years Surrey County Cricket Club has adopted Whitgift as one of its two venues for 1st XI games away from the Oval. This year saw initially a 4-day Championship game and a 1-day Pro 40 match, with over 6,000 attending but Whitgift has also had a televised t20 game on 4th July v Sussex Sharks.

Whitgift has won five National cricket titles in the last eleven years, the last being at Under 13 level in 2007 when they beat Solihull School at Oundle. This year's Under 13 squad have prepared for the Bunbury National Cup competition by touring Dubai over the Easter holidays for two weeks.

Whitgift regularly puts out three XI's at every year group from Under 11 up to the 1st XI. Master-in-charge of Cricket, David Ward, who played for Surrey in the 80's and 90's for 16 years, is assisted by Head Cricket Coach and former Surrey and Glamorgan spinner, Neil Kendrick. The U13 coach, Sam Woodward, also is a former Whitgift pupil and ESCA Cup winning captain when at the School in 1998. Under team manager, Simon Beck, who has led the School U13 team and has been involved in all six National cricket successes, hopes are high for another enjoyable and exciting Final.
